*Is the Major Provider of Arts Programs & Services for Artists and Arts Organizations, and the Public in Durham*



# Durham: A Leading Creative Economy


- Based on 2011 Arts & Economic Prosperity IV Study [commissioned & funded by Durham Arts Council for Durham:](#)
- \$ 125.5 Million in Economic Impact Annually via nonprofit arts & cultural organizations and their audiences in Durham.
- 4,550 FTE Jobs Supported
- Durham's non-profit arts/cultural sector provides \$6,099,000 revenue to Local Government; \$5,335, 000 to State Gov.



# Durham Arts Council Building

## 1980's Campaign to Create a Home for the Arts

*Durham Arts Council leaders do what it takes to strengthen the arts in Durham!*

*In the mid-1980's, DAC launched a capital and community campaign to seek private and public support to renovate the aging City Hall building that DAC had occupied since 1978. DAC raised over \$1 million in cash plus additional in-kind donations, and the City and County each provided \$2.15 million.*

*Following the renovation of DAC, the Durham Arts Council provided leadership to build a renovation campaign and community effort to restore the Carolina Theatre*

# Durham Arts Council Building Today

*A Creative Home Where We Share & Showcase the Artistic Expressions of a Diverse Community*

- *This City-owned building is a premier multi-arts venue for artists, arts organizations and community groups.*
- *This arts center facility is a treasure for Durham. It is the only arts facility of its kind in the Triangle.*
- *This building is a pivotal structure in Downtown Durham Historic District as designated by National Register of Historic Places*



*Built in 1906, this is Durham's oldest building in continuous public service.*

# Durham Arts Council Attracts Visitors & Residents to Downtown

- **Annual Attendance to all DAC programs and events on-site and off-site has grown 158% in 11 years**

- **FY2002: 160,416**


- **FY2013: 413,965**

\* **DAC Building Attendance was 351,587 in FY13. Building attendance has grown 120% since FY02.**

**Including building visitors, festival attendance and other programs, DAC is the 4th largest visitor attraction in downtown Durham, delivering important economic impact and enhancing quality of the community.**



- *CAPS also serves at-risk youth in Title One Schools and Lakeview Schools.*


# 39<sup>th</sup> Annual Durham Arts Council's CenterFest

# DAC Has Built Organizational Strength

- In the past 11 years DAC has implemented new organizational systems to better manage operations and to achieve growth, sustainability, and excellence in mission delivery and management:
  - Organizational assessment and staff restructuring & reduction
  - Ongoing evaluation and improvement of all programs and services
  - New financial systems and reporting
  - Growing earned and contributed revenues; and reduced expense to achieve sustainability and overcome past deficits.
  - New personnel management systems
  - Improved technology and support systems

FY2006 – 2013 have all been net positive on core operations with the exception of FY2008.

FY2008 incurred a net operations loss of \$103,193 during building Renovations Phase I and beginning of recession.

DAC has systematically paid down debt incurred in previous years, and currently has only a \$100K line of credit debt; and \$125K that it needs to reinvest in the DAC Endowment to build long term reserves.

# Durham Arts Council

## Annual Arts Fund

- *The DAC Annual Arts Fund is the annual volunteer driven campaign for the arts in Durham.*
- *Each year, DAC must raise \$1.2 million of its \$2 million annual budget through contributions and grants from individuals, corporations, public sector, and foundations.*
- *Donations support grants and services for arts organizations and artists, and arts education opportunities for all ages.*



# Durham Arts Council

is a strong investment for the City of Durham

- *For each \$1 that the City of Durham invests in the Durham Arts Council, DAC generates another \$2 on average in additional earned revenue and private and public donations and grants.*
- *City funding comprises approximately 1/3 of DAC funding, and DAC raises 2/3 on its own.*
- *DAC has grown its service levels to the public dramatically – up 158% - and the DAC Building and City support helps provide a strong base for the arts in Durham.*
