DURHAM, N.C. – A mobile hydration station designed to promote Durham's tap water and reduce reliance on disposable plastic bottles; major improvement projects at the City's water treatment plants and water reclamation facilities; and top honors for having the state's best tasting drinking water – these and other achievements are highlighted in the 2018 water quality report, "Water Works for You."
