2nd Quarter 2013 Executive Summary
Police Chief Jose L. Lopez Sr.

The Durham Police Department's 2nd Quarter report will provide highlights from the 2nd Quarter as well as January through June year-to-date Part 1 crime statistics for the past three years. I would like to discuss a few highlights.

The most significant aspect of the report is that reported Part 1 index crime was at a 15-year low for the first six months of 2013. Part 1 crimes include homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. This was due, in large part, to significant drops in burglaries and aggravated assaults.

Reported property crime (burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft) was at a 15-year low while reported violent crime (homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) was the lowest it has been since 2005.

One of the department's top priorities in recent years has been the reduction and prevention of violent crime. We created a Violent Incident Response Team (VIRT) in 2011 to target violent crime, particularly gun crime, and violent offenders. They particularly focus on cases which may involve retaliatory violence. We have also continued to strengthen our partnerships with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies and with the community.

We continue to see a downward trend in our burglaries. We believe that our Residential Awareness Program (RAP) initiative, which started in the fall of 2011, has contributed to the reduction in residential burglaries. This initiative combines crime analysis, crime prevention efforts and high visibility patrols.

Our 513 sworn positions were 99 percent filled at the end of the second quarter. We started a Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLET) Academy in August and our sworn positions are now fully staffed.

The assessors from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) held an on-site assessment at the Durham Police Department in June. The accreditation program requires agencies to comply with state-of-the-art standards in four basic areas: policy and procedures, administration, operations, and support services. The Durham Police Department has been a CALEA accredited agency since 1991 but this year we decided to go for a gold standard accreditation, which is the highest level possible. We recently have been told that the Durham Police Department did very well during the process and we are being recommended for the gold standard.

Part 1 index crime (total of Part 1 violent and Part 1 property crimes) was at a 15-year low for the first six months of 2013, which was a continuation of the 1st quarter trend. Part 1 property crime was also at a 15-year low for the first six months and Part 1 violent crime was the lowest since 2005. Overall violent crime (homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) was down 9 percent during the first six months of 2013 compared to the same time in 2012. Overall property crime (burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft) dropped 5 percent during the same period and overall Part 1 crime was down 5.7 percent.

Homicides – There were 13 homicides reported during the first six months of 2013. Arrests have been made in four cases and one case was a murder-suicide. Two cases of the 13 cases have been ruled as self-defense. Six cases remain open at this time. One case – the murder-suicide – involved domestic violence. Investigators also cleared three cold case homicides during the first six months of the year – two from 2011 and one from 2012.

Rapes – There was an increase in the number of reported rapes during the first quarter of 2013 but the FBI expanded its definition of forcible rape, effective January 2013, and that affected this year’s statistics. Thirteen of the rapes in the 2013 report would not have been classified as rapes under the previous guidelines.

Robberies – Robberies were up during the first six months of 2013 but investigators have made several arrests that cleared multiple robberies.

Aggravated Assaults - There was a significant decrease in the number of aggravated assaults during the first six months of the year. The total number of victims decreased by 19 percent while the number of actual incidents was down by 12 percent. The Durham Police Department has taken several steps to be proactive in dealing with violent crime. Our Violent Incident Response Team, which was put into place in 2011, looks closely at all cases which may involve retaliatory violence. Our partnerships with state and federal agencies are stronger than ever and we continue to rely on data-driven analysis to help prevent violent crime.

Burglaries – Burglaries continued to drop during the first six months of 2013. Ninety percent of the burglaries were to homes and in 83 percent of the cases, entry was forced. The most commonly stolen items included computer hardware and software, jewelry, electronic items and cash. We believe that the Police Department’s Residential Awareness Program (RAP) has contributed to the downward trend in burglaries. The RAP program was put in place in the fall of 2011 to target burglaries and uses a proactive, data-driven approach to reduce residential burglaries. The Police Department’s Crime Analysis Unit examines reports to determine locations and neighborhoods where burglaries are likely to occur in the near future. Crime prevention officers speak with residents to provide them with crime prevention tips and to urge them to call 911 to report suspicious activity. Officers have made several burglary arrests as the result of such calls.

Larcenies – Metal thefts continue to be an issue, both in Durham and throughout the country. During the second quarter, thefts of air-conditioning coils were a particular concern. Officers conducted several operations targeting metal thefts during this quarter. In addition to metal, other items stolen included money, credit/debit cards, tools, electronic items and computer equipment.

Motor Vehicle Thefts – Hondas continue to be the most stolen vehicle in Durham. Officers arrested several people for stealing Hondas during the first six months of 2013. There was also an increase in the thefts of scooters and mopeds.

Significant 2nd Quarter Violent Crime Arrests

Murder Arrests

Murder Arrest – Christopher Terrell Stanback, who was wanted for murder, was arrested by members of the U.S. Marshals Service Joint Fugitive Task Force on June 28. They also arrested a second man who was wanted on drug and child abuse charges. Both men were arrested at the Extended Stay America on Tower Boulevard.

Durham police detectives charged Stanback, 25, of Summit Street with murder in the June 18 shooting death of 37-year-old Jermaine Andrea McDonald. Officers were dispatched to a shooting call in the 100 block of North Hyde Park Avenue at 11:40 a.m. on June 18. When they arrived, they found McDonald lying in the street. He had been shot and was pronounced dead at the scene. The shooting did not appear to be a random act, according to investigators.

Officers also arrested Cephus Stanback, 27, of Hart Street who was wanted on several orders for arrest/true bills of indictment for drug and other charges. The charges included possession of marijuana and cocaine with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver, fleeing to elude law enforcement officers, careless and reckless driving, assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury, child abuse and possession of drug paraphernalia. The charges against Cephus Stanback stem from several incidents earlier this year.

Murder Arrests – Two people – Hope Farley, 19, of Durham and Thomas Antwan Clayton, 21, of Morrisville – were arrested in April and charged with murder in the April 18 shooting death of 19-year-old JeJuan Jonteil Taylor in a parking lot at Duke Manor Apartments, 311 South LaSalle Street. Farley and Clayton were both also charged with conspiring to commit robbery with a dangerous weapon. The shooting did not appear to be a random incident, according to investigators.

Fugitive Murder Arrest - Brandon Hemphill was arrested June 7 on Rippling Stream Road by members of the U.S. Marshals Service Joint Fugitive Task Force. Hemphill, 21, was wanted on charges from Inkster, Michigan. The charges included two counts of armed robbery, one count of kidnapping, one count of murder and two counts of attempted murder.

Robbery Arrests

Robbery/Kidnapping Arrests - Durham police investigators charged three men in connection with a kidnapping and the armed robbery of Jared Galleria of Jewelry at 6813 Fayetteville Road in June. According to investigators, a store employee was followed from the store, kidnapped by two males armed with guns and forced to return to the store around 11 p.m. on June 25. A third suspect followed them back to the store. The employee was forced to unlock the business and the suspects took cash and a large amount of jewelry. The suspects also robbed the victim and took her vehicle.

Shortly after the suspects fled from the scene, officers attempted to stop the two vehicles but the drivers refused to stop. Officers chased one vehicle on Meridian Parkway, where the vehicle crashed into a concrete barrier. The driver, identified as Denzel Timothy Rasheem Shivers, 19, of Fuquay-Varina, was extricated from the vehicle and taken to the hospital for treatment.

Officers chased the second vehicle to Kit Creek Road in Cary, where the driver stopped the vehicle and the occupants fled on foot. The two males in the vehicle – identified as Vendai Larpist Irick, 22, of Fuquay-Varina and Rodney Jerrold Devin Byrd, 20, of Cary – later turned themselves in to police. Shivers, Byrd and Irick were all been charged with second-degree kidnapping, two counts of robbery with a dangerous weapon, larceny of motor vehicle, possession of a stolen motor vehicle, three counts of felony conspiracy and felony fleeing to elude arrest. Investigators recovered the stolen jewelry from the vehicle that wrecked on Kit Creek Road.

Robbery Arrest – Officers responded to a robbery call in the 1900 block of Holloway Street shortly before 6 a.m. on May 26. A 38-year-old male told officers he was leaving a Laundromat when a male walked up to him, smashed him in the face with a fire extinguisher and took his cash. A description of the suspect was broadcast and officers from Squad 1-A found a man matching the description on Herbert Street. Tyrone Stewart Alston Jr., 41, of Durham was arrested and charged with assault inflicting serious injury and robbery. The victim was taken to the hospital for treatment.

Robbery & Fraud Charges - Durham police investigators charged Tomako Deangelo Bass and Craigory Lamonte Bass with common-law robbery and felony conspiracy in connection with a June 9 robbery of a customer using an ATM at Bank of America on Shannon Road. Tomako Bass was also charged with common-law robbery, second-degree kidnapping, felony conspiracy, communicating threats and attempting to obtain property by false pretense in connection with a June 18 robbery of a customer using an ATM at Bank of America on Shannon Road. In addition, Tomako Bass was charged with obtaining property by false pretense, uttering forged instruments and communicating threats. He is accused of depositing a forged check in this case.

Robbery Arrests - A Durham police officer arrested two men on armed robbery, kidnapping and assault charges on May 22 after a male who had been kidnapped escaped and flagged the officer down for help. The two men – Traqwuan Nelson, 18, of Burrell Road and Alvin Azariah Jones, 21, of South Woodcrest Street – were each charged with robbery with a dangerous weapon, first-degree kidnapping, assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury and felony conspiracy. Both men were placed in Durham County Jail under \$1 million bonds. The victim told officers he was walking to his vehicle at the BP convenience store at 2406 Holloway Street around 1:15 a.m. when two males armed with guns approached him and forced him into his vehicle. The two males got in the car with him and forced him to drive to an ATM at The Village Shopping Center on North Miami Boulevard. The two males struck the victim several times in the head and face with their guns. The victim spotted Durham Police Officer K.F. Wheeler patrolling in the shopping center and managed

to escape from his vehicle. The victim told her what had happened and Officer Wheeler arrested Jones and Nelson while they were still in the victim's vehicle.

Bank Robbery Arrest – Officers responded to a bank robbery call at SunTrust, 3459 Hillsborough Road on May 23. A male armed with a gun and wearing a stocking over his face robbed the bank. No one was injured. Investigators arrested Shonte Sasser, 29, of Durham on May 29 and charged him with robbery. Sasser was also charged with a probation violation.

Robbery Arrest – Three people told officers that two males forced their way into an apartment on Weymouth Street in May, pointed guns at the residents and took a television set, an iPad and cash. Officers arrested Miguel Lucas Jr., 19, of Charles Street and charged him with three counts of robbery with a dangerous weapon, three counts of second-degree kidnapping, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, assault by pointing a gun, breaking and entering, larceny, larceny after a burglary, possession of stolen goods, obtaining property by false pretense and conspiracy to commit a felony.

Robbery Arrests – Two men – Duane Curtis Bond and Vernon Toomer - were arrested in April in connection with a series of robberies/attempted robberies in bank parking lots during March and April.

Bond, 43, of Maymount Drive was charged with attempted common-law robbery and felony conspiracy in connection with an April 12 incident at Wells Fargo at 3600 North Duke Street.

Bond was also arrested on charges from three incidents in March. He was charged with common-law robbery, felony conspiracy and possession of a stolen vehicle in connection with the following cases:

- **March 12 in the parking lot of SunTrust Bank, 5112 North Roxboro Street.** A male told officers he was coming out of the bank when a vehicle pulled up next to him and man wearing a hoodie jumped out. The man demanded the victim's money and fought with him before grabbing the money and fleeing. Officers found a stolen car believed to have been used in the robbery a short time later on Seven Oaks Road.
- **March 15 in the parking lot of Northgate Mall, 1058 West Club Boulevard.** A female was carrying a deposit bag and getting ready to walk into the mall when a male wearing a mask and a hoodie ran up behind her and grabbed her bank bag. He fled in a vehicle driven by a second person.
- **March 18 in the parking lot of SunTrust Bank, 2008 East NC 54 Highway.** A male was walking toward the bank with a deposit bag when a man wearing a black toboggan and dark hoodie ran up to him and grabbed his bank bag. The man fled in a vehicle driven by a second person.

Bond was arrested with a second man by Orange County Sheriff's deputies on April 23 following a robbery in the parking lot of a Wells Fargo Bank in Mebane. Bond was charged with common-law robbery and possession of a stolen vehicle in connection with the Mebane robbery.

Toomer, 40, of Morreene Road was charged with attempted common-law robbery, conspiracy and possession of a stolen vehicle in connection with an April 8 incident at Wells Fargo at 3600 North Duke Street

Robbery Arrests – Two men were arrested and charged with robbing a female and attempting to rob a male at gunpoint as they walked on Kent Street on May 3. Javon Winstead, 20, of Yancey Street was arrested on May 17 on charges of robbery with a dangerous weapon, attempted robbery with a dangerous weapon and possession of stolen goods. He was also charged with a felony probation violation and was placed in Durham County Jail without bond. Members of the U.S. Marshals Service Joint Fugitive Task Force arrested Tracy Holloway Umstead, 23, of Cornell Street on June 26 at a home on N.C. 751 in Durham. Umstead was arrested on charges of robbery with a dangerous weapon, attempted robbery with a dangerous weapon, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and possession of stolen property. He was placed in Durham County Jail under a \$500,000 bond.

Robbery Arrests – Two men were arrested on April 14 and charged with robbing a female at gunpoint as she got out of her car with two children in the parking lot of 311 South LaSalle Street. The suspects approached the victim, displayed a gun and stole her purse. Officers arrested Michael Jerome Henry, 19, of Camellia Drive and Robert Turner, 18, of Chapel Hill Road and charged them both with robbery with a dangerous weapon, conspiracy to commit robbery and assault by pointing a gun. Officers recovered a gun and several items belonging to the victim.

Robbery Arrests – On April 30, two males were walking on Cheek Road near Wittenburg Way when a gray vehicle with three occupants pulled up next to them and one occupant jumped out. The suspect robbed the victims at gunpoint of backpacks, a laptop computer and two phones. The vehicle was later located on Morreene Road. Daniel Enrique Flores, 17, of Morreene Road and two 15-year-old males were charged with robbery with a dangerous weapon and felony conspiracy.

Robbery Arrest – Officers responded to an armed robbery at the BP convenience store, 2918 Guess Road shortly after 9:30 p.m. on May 19. A male armed with a gun robbed an employee of cash. Investigators arrested Tony Anthony Person, 30, of Durham and charged him with robbery with a dangerous weapon and second degree kidnapping.

Robbery, Burglary Charges - Peter Warren Chambers II, 23, of Mahone Street was arrested and charged with an April 26 robbery at Rite Aid, 101 Woodcroft Parkway. A male armed with a gun and wearing a black bandana over the lower half of his face entered the business shortly before 10 p.m. and demanded money from an employee. He then forced two employees into an office at gunpoint. Chambers was charged with one count of robbery with a dangerous weapon and two counts of kidnapping. Chambers was also charged with breaking into a home on Mayruth Drive in February and stealing cash and a television set.

Aggravated Assault Arrests

Shooting Arrest – On June 27, officers responded to a disturbance with a weapon call in the 900 block of East Main Street. Officers were told that a male had fired several shots at a female known to him. Markecio Barker, 16, of Dale Street was arrested in August on charges of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, communicating threats, going armed to the terror of the public, discharging a firearm within the city limits and possession of a firearm by a minor.

Shooting Arrest – Investigators charged Calvin Montrell Harris, 27, of Kingston Mill Court in connection with a May 5 shooting on South Elm Street. A male was riding in a vehicle when he was shot in the arm by a male who pulled up beside his vehicle. The victim was treated at a local hospital for non-life-threatening injuries. The victim and suspect knew each other, according to investigators. Harris was arrested May 15 on Sugarwood Place on charges of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill inflicting serious injury and shooting into an occupied vehicle.

Shooting Arrest – Two males were arrested and charged in connection with a May 3 shooting on Liberty Street. A 49-year-old man told officers he was walking in the 500 block of Liberty Street around 4:45 p.m. on May 3 when males in a passing vehicle shot him in the arm. Michael Maurice “Mike Mike” Gill, 19, of Dayton Street and Jamal Dunston, 18, of Lawson Street were both arrested and charged with assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury and felony conspiracy.

Shooting Arrests – Two teens were charged with a May 7 shooting on Eva Street. A 36-year-old male was walking in the 800 block of Eva Street around 8:30 p.m. when two males approached him from behind and shot him. The suspects fled in a van. Tyrico “Smiley” Bowens, 19, of Grant Street and Jarrion Elgric Hood, 17, of Angier Avenue were both charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill inflicting serious injury and kidnapping.

Shooting Arrests – Officers responded to a shooting in the 500 block of Liberty Street on May 17 and found a 24-year-old female who had been shot in the foot. Investigators later learned that the shooting was accidental. Two men - Jaamel Alameen Adams, 23, of Raynor Street and Eric Lamont Stevons, 20, of Chalmers Street – were arrested and charged with possession of a stolen firearm and possession of a firearm with an altered serial number. Adams was also charged with discharging a firearm within the city limits and Stevons was also charged with trespassing.

Shooting Arrest - Durham police investigators arrested Demario “Dee Dee” Martin on attempted murder and other felony charges. Officers responded to a shooting call in the parking lot of a convenience store in the 2900 block of Holloway Street shortly on June 18. They later determined that the victim – a 36-year-old male – had been shot in the 3100 block of Hursey Street and drove himself to the convenience store to get help. In addition to the attempted murder charge, Martin, 37, of Walton Street was charged with attempted robbery with a dangerous weapon, discharging a firearm into occupied property, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and discharging a weapon within the city limits.

Assault/Robbery Arrests – On June 16 officers responded to a call in the 2000 block of Chapel Hill Road about several juveniles harassing a burn victim. When officers arrived, they discovered that the juveniles had poured milk on the victim, backed him up into a wall and taken his food, wallet and shoes. Officers searched the area and found seven juveniles – three 13-year-olds, three 14-year-olds and one 15-year-old – believed to have been involved in the incident. Investigators took out juvenile petitions charging the juveniles with robbery and two were also charged with assault on a handicapped person.

Significant 2nd Quarter Property Crime Arrests

Kidnapping, Car Theft Charges - Durham police investigators charged Terryon Lamont McEachin with stealing a car with two children inside it June 7 on Fayetteville Street. A man told officers he stopped at a convenience store in the 900 block of Fayetteville Street to get gas around 2:15 p.m. He left the car running with his two children - ages 4 and 9 - inside and went in the store to pay for the gas. When he came back outside, he realized the vehicle had been stolen. The children were found unharmed a short time later in front of a business in the 1000 block of East Pettigrew Street. The car was found abandoned in the 3700 block of Angier Avenue. McEachin, 23, of Kristy Place was charged with one count of larceny of motor vehicle and two counts of kidnapping. He is also facing numerous charges from the Durham County Sheriff's Office in connection with an alleged stolen vehicle salvage yard scheme. He has been placed in Durham County Jail under a \$245,000 bond.

Burglary Charges – On May 28, officers responded to a shooting call at the Super 8 motel on Guess Road. When they arrived, they discovered that it was actually a first degree burglary case. The resident was inside the room around 3:45 a.m. when she heard the front window break and a male entered her room. The male took cash from the room and fled in a silver car. A description of the car was broadcast to all officers and K9 Officer M.D. Mues located a vehicle matching the description on Edward Street. The driver of the car – Jason Robinson, 26, of Ridgeway Avenue – was arrested and charged with first degree burglary, larceny, possession of burglary tools and damage to property. Robinson was also wanted on charges from Georgia, including possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Cell Phone Thefts – Durham police investigated a rash of cell phone thefts during the second quarter. Several arrests were made and investigators are still trying to locate Dormeca Ann Sutton who has been charged in connection with numerous phone thefts. Sutton, 28, of Lawson Street is charged with eight counts of felony larceny and eight counts of possession of stolen property.

In most cases, the victim was walking down the street when a car with two or more occupants stopped the victim and a female in the car asked to use the phone to make an emergency call. Once the victim lent the female their phone, the suspects fled the scene. In one case, the suspects grabbed the phone from the victim's hand and drove away.

Officers made two arrests in the phone theft cases on June 12 when officers responded to a larceny call. The victim was able to give officers a vehicle description and HEAT 2 officers located a vehicle matching the description near North Roxboro Street and Avondale Drive. Officers arrested Jelse Chance, 17, and Majesty McNeil, 17, both of Durham and charged them with numerous phone thefts. A fourth female – Princess Laisure, 24, of Cedar Grove – was also charged with stealing several phones.

Vehicle Larceny Arrests – Demario Jones, 25, of Chalk Level Road was arrested on April 24 by members of the U.S. Marshals Service Joint Fugitive Task Force after he got out of a stolen vehicle and ran into a house in the 2000 block of South Alston Avenue. Jones barricaded himself in the house but surrendered after a brief standoff. Jones was charged with 11 counts of larceny of motor vehicle, nine counts of larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories and one count of possession of a stolen motor vehicle. James Williams, 23, of Shirley Caesar Court was also arrested in connection with this series of vehicle thefts. Williams was charged with 10 counts of larceny of a motor vehicle and nine counts of larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories. Williams was arrested on February 21 when officers responded to a break-in to a vehicle in progress call on Tattersall Drive. Williams was arrested at the scene and charged with attempting to break into a Honda Accord.

Burglary Arrests – Downtown bicycle officers were on patrol around 12:30 a.m. on April 17 when they spotted a break-in at Trosa Furniture and Frame on Foster Street. Officers noticed that the door frame was shattered and cash register receipts were scattered on the ground. The bicycle officers circulated the area and heard loud crashing noises coming from the nearby woods. They found Kevin Green, 44, of Liberty Street coming out of the woods. They also found a cash register in the woods. Green was charged with breaking and entering, larceny after breaking and entering, possession of burglary tools, injury to personal property and injury to real property.

Burglary Arrests – Officers responded to a burglary at an office complex on Gilbert Street on May 19 and discovered that several offices had been burglarized. They also found a trail of blood inside the building. A few minutes later, Officer K.L. Gregory spotted a male – 51-year-old Melvin Calvin Ray – in the 500 block of Liberty Street. Ray was bleeding heavily from several cuts on his hands. Officers also linked Ray to a break-in to a business on Parrish Street and break-ins to vehicles on Carlton Avenue and Ottawa Avenue on the same day. Ray was charged with seven counts of breaking and entering, two counts of breaking into a vehicle, one count of larceny and one count of possession of stolen goods.

Grill/Pig Cooker Arrests - Durham police investigators arrested Raymond Lamont Bailey, 27, of Durham and charged him with felony larceny and felony habitual larceny in connection with the May 23 theft of a large \$4,000 pig cooker from the driveway of a home off Mineral Springs Road. Bailey was also charged with felony larceny and felony habitual larceny in connection with the April 26 theft of a trailer and 300 pounds of bricks from a driveway near Farrington Road.

Drug Trafficking Arrests

LSD Trafficking Arrest - Officer R.A. Armstrong was conducting a directed patrol in the Swann's Mill subdivision on April 2 when he noticed a suspicious vehicle. The driver fled and struck a parked vehicle causing extensive damage to both cars. The suspect and vehicle were found on Hebron Road a short distance from the scene. Officers recovered 4,618 dosage units of LSD, 30 grams of mushrooms, and 20 grams of Mephedrone as well as assorted drug paraphernalia. Charles Partin, 28, of Pittsboro was charged with two counts of trafficking LSD, two counts of possession with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver Schedule 1 controlled substances, possession of Mephedrone with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver, maintaining a vehicle for the sale or possession of controlled substances, fleeing to elude a law enforcement official, driving while impaired, identity theft and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Heroin Trafficking Arrests – On June 12, HEAT 2 investigators conducted a knock and talk at 1804 Kirkwood Drive in reference to a possible stolen vehicle. Investigators served a search warrant and located heroin and cocaine inside the house. Cynthia Swisher, 39, of Raleigh, Michael Burton, 21, of Bahama and Jeremy Lee Burton, 25, of Guess Road were all arrested and charged with trafficking in heroin, possession with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver controlled substances within 1,000 feet of a park and other drug offenses.

Cocaine Trafficking Arrests – Investigators with the Major Crimes Unit served a search warrant on Mathison Street on May 14 and confiscated crack cocaine, heroin, marijuana and a stolen firearm. Two residents – Latiesha Monique Wall, 28, and Stephen Lamont Steele Jr., 25 – were charged with trafficking in cocaine, possession of a stolen firearm, possession of heroin with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver and two counts of child abuse. Steele was also charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Percocet Trafficking Arrest – On May 14, investigators with the Interdiction Unit concluded a long-term investigation by arresting Ramon Linares, 30, of Hillsborough. Linares was charged with 10 counts of trafficking Percocet and several other felony drug offenses.

Cocaine Trafficking Arrest – On April 12, investigators with the Special Operations Division's Major Crimes Unit concluded a long-term undercover investigation and arrested Metodio Jacinto Jimenez, 28, of Chapel Hill Road. He was charged with four counts of trafficking cocaine and 10 other drug charges. Investigators seized 43.2 grams of cocaine during the investigation.

Cocaine Trafficking Arrest – A HEAT 1 officer stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation May 30 on South Miami Boulevard near Lynn Road and discovered more than 30 grams of cocaine in the vehicle. The driver – Luis Apolonio-Gomez, 42, of Durham – was charged with trafficking in cocaine, possession of cocaine with the intent to sell or deliver, maintaining a vehicle for the sale or

delivery of controlled substances, possession of drug paraphernalia, following too closely and no operator's license.

Heroin Trafficking Arrest – On April 23, investigators with the Special Operations Division's Interdiction Unit concluded a long-term undercover operation with the arrest of Robert Lee Clayton, 35, of West Geer Street. Clayton was charged with trafficking heroin, two counts of possession of cocaine with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver, sale and delivery of heroin and cocaine and two counts of selling a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a school/park. A second man, Stephen Lavance Oates Jr., 24, of West Geer Street, was charged with manufacturing marijuana, maintaining a dwelling for the sale of controlled substances and possession of a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a school/park.

Drug Trafficking Arrest – Officers from the Special Operations Division's Interdiction Unit served a search warrant on June 2 at 3306 Alabama Avenue. A search revealed 527 grams of molly (MDMC), 28.2 grams of mushrooms and 4.6 grams of marijuana. Kyle Miller, 27, of 3306 Alabama Avenue was charged with trafficking schedule I and four other drug offenses.

Methadone Trafficking Arrest - On June 8, members of the Special Operation Division's Major Crimes Unit executed a search warrant at 620 Massey Ave. Investigators located 70 Methadone pills and miscellaneous drug paraphernalia. Zelda Bass, 31, of Massey Avenue was charged with trafficking Methadone.

Heroin Traffic Arrest - On June 21, the Special Operations Division's Major Crimes Unit executed a search warrant at 26 Stonewall Way and seized 49.8 grams of heroin and a stolen Smith and Wesson 9mm handgun. Maurice Tyrone Jacobs, 39, of 26 Stonewall Way was charged with one count of Level 3 trafficking in heroin, three counts of Level 1 trafficking in heroin, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a stolen firearm and eight additional drug offenses.

Cocaine Trafficking Arrest – Investigators from the Special Operations Division arrested Jerel Louis Thomas, 34, of Avon Lake Drive in June and charged him with eight counts of trafficking in cocaine, two counts of maintaining a vehicle for the sale of controlled substances, two counts of possession of cocaine with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia. Officers confiscated 227 grams of powder cocaine.

Heroin Trafficking Arrest – On June 17, Officer A.M. Hansrote stopped a car for a headlight violation. He learned that the driver – Daameon Coshan Smith, 36, of Durham – was wanted on numerous charges from the Police Department's Special Operations Division. Smith was arrested on warrants charging him with four counts of trafficking in heroin, two counts of possession of heroin with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver, selling heroin and delivering heroin.

Heroin Trafficking Arrest – HEAT 2 officers investigated drug complaints at 1309 Hudson Avenue on May 23 and located 210 bindles of heroin inside an apartment. Michael Lunsford, 43, of 1309 Hudson Avenue was arrested and charged with trafficking heroin, possession of controlled

substances within 1,000 feet of a school and maintaining a dwelling for the sale of controlled substances. HEAT 2 officers also arrested Lunsford during May at a traffic stop on Sovereign Street at Guess Road. They charged him with trafficking in heroin, possession of heroin and cocaine with the intent to manufacture, sell or deliver, possession of marijuana, possession of a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a park, possession of drug paraphernalia and having an open container of alcohol.

Highlighted 2nd Quarter Special Operations & Initiatives

American Tobacco Trail – Officers from throughout the department conducted directed patrols on the American Tobacco Trail during the second quarter. Officers conducted more than 300 directed patrols in April, May and June by walking, jogging, bicycling and using the Gator utility terrain vehicles. The patrols included increased presence at major trail intersections, walks through high usage sections and contacts with citizens.

Speeding Operations - On June 26, the Traffic Services Unit conducted three speeding operations between 7 a.m. and noon. The first operation was held on Interstate 40 West near Fayetteville Road and resulted in 30 speeding violations and two other traffic charges. Officers issued 25 speeding tickets and four other citations at Durham-Chapel Hill Boulevard and Southwest Durham Parkway. The third operation, which was held at U.S. 15-501 South and Morreene Road, resulted in 24 speeding citations and three other charges.

Booze It and Lose It – 2013 Operation Firecracker – The Durham Police Department held a multi-agency DWI checking station on Holloway Street at Joyland Avenue on June 27-28 to kick off the 2013 Independence Day "Operation Firecracker" Booze It and Lose It campaign. Officers used a BATMobile from the Governor's Highway Safety Program. Officers made six DWI arrests and issued 15 citations for revoked driver's licenses, nine citations for no driver's license and one child seat violation citation. Officers apprehended two wanted fugitives and recovered one stolen vehicle. Officers also filed two drug charges. Participating agencies included Durham Police Department, Durham County Sheriff's Office, N.C. State Highway Patrol, North Carolina Central University Police Department, Duke University Police Department, Hillsborough Police Department, State Alcohol Law Enforcement, NC DMV License and Theft Bureau, and Morrisville Police Department.

Crosswalk Enforcement Operation – District 2D Officer David Kub organized a pedestrian safety/crosswalk operation for District 2 during June. Officer Kub worked closely with PAC 2 members to choose locations for the operations. The operations were held at North Buchanan Boulevard and Monmouth Avenue, Glendale Avenue and Acadia Street and West Club Boulevard and Oval Drive. Officers issued 88 citations for failure to yield in a crosswalk and 33 other traffic violations. They arrested two people and served a warrant.

Prostitution Arrests - Durham police officers made seven arrests on May 1 in an operation targeting prostitution on Fayetteville Street between Umstead Street and Simmons Street and on

South Alston Avenue between Linwood Avenue and Lawson Street. Officers from Squad 4-D and HEAT 4 conducted the operation.

Indecent Exposure Arrest - Wayne Antonio Morris, 22, of Holloway Street was arrested on April 8 after two females reported that a man had exposed himself to them in the 900 block of Liberty Street shortly after 9 a.m. Officers located a male matching the description of the suspect a short distance away in the 1000 block of North Alston Avenue. Morris was arrested and charged with two counts of indecent exposure. He was also charged with exposing himself to eight children in three prior cases in the same area (Taylor Street, Hyde Park Avenue and Alston Avenue) since December. He was charged with eight counts of felony taking indecent liberties with a child in those cases. Officers had passed out flyers in the neighborhood and done undercover operations in an attempt to locate and identify the suspect in these cases.

Click It or Ticket & Child Safety Seat Operation - The Durham Police Department's Traffic Services Unit partnered with Safe Kids Durham County on May 31 and conducted a Click It or Ticket operation on North Mangum Street. During this operation, 33 vehicles were stopped resulting in the following charges:

- 30 Seatbelt violations
- 3 Child seat restraint violations
- 2 Driving while license revoked charges
- 2 No operator's license
- 6 Other traffic violations

Safe Kids Durham County installed nine child seats during this operation.

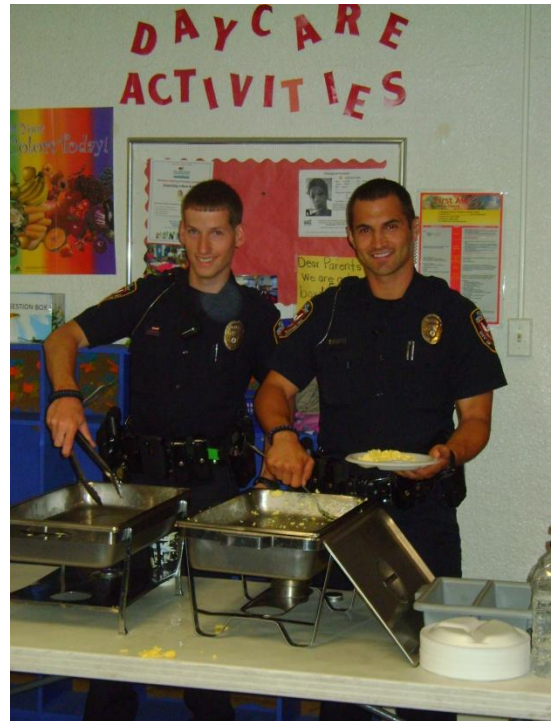
Highlighted 2nd Quarter Community Activities

Law Enforcement Week Camps - The G.R.E.A.T. Unit partnered with the Durham County Sheriff's Office School Resource Officers and Durham Parks and Recreation to hold the first of four "Law Enforcement Week" Camps from June 24-28. It was held at East Durham Center with approximately 30 participants. The School Resources Officers taught classes about law enforcement activities such as Uniform Patrol, K-9, SWAT/SET, Bomb Squad and the Bicycle Unit. They also talked about bullying/cyber-bullying and "Perfect Friend." Participants were given demonstrations from various units including SET, K-9, Bomb Squad, Uniform Patrol and SRO/GREAT. The kids took part in a bicycle rodeo with the DPD Bike Unit. The three additional camps were held during the 3rd Quarter at Holton Resource Center, Walltown and Weaver Street Community Center.

G.R.E.A.T. Summer Camp - The G.R.E.A.T. Unit held the first of three free G.R.E.A.T. camps during the second quarter from June 17-21. Thirty-two participants attended and had a fun week. Camp participants took part in a mock teen court trial and visited the Durham County Detention Center. They attended classes involving a "Perfect Friend" and gang awareness. There were

demonstrations by the Durham Police K-9 Unit and Selective Enforcement Team as well as by the Durham County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue Team. Participants took part in team and individual sports competitions, skated at a roller rink and saw a movie.

Community Service – Officers from Squad 2A served breakfast for the homeless at Russell Memorial Church during their weekend training in May.



Peace Officers Memorial Service - The 27th Annual Durham County Peace Officers Memorial Service was held at 11 a.m. on Friday, May 3 at Grey Stone Baptist Church, 2601 Hillsborough Road. The keynote speaker was Durham County Sheriff Michael D. Andrews. The service is held every year to remember law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty and to honor their families. The service also pays tribute to current and retired law enforcement officers. Officers from several Durham law enforcement agencies participated in the program.

Project Safe Neighborhoods – During the second quarter, PSN Coordinator Jennifer Snyder designed and distributed monthly FaithActs bulletin inserts and updates. She also coordinated FaithActs van tours in Districts 1, 3, 4 and 5. A Lunch and Learn event was held on May 2 for district commanders and FaithActs partner pastors. In addition, Snyder completed a PSN Gang Awareness booklet in Spanish and facilitated safety fairs in three target neighborhoods with outreach to 200 residents.

Police READS - Sworn and non-sworn Durham Police Department employees were Police READS volunteers who served as classroom tutors and mentors for 2nd and 3rd grade classes at Y.E. Smith Elementary School during March and April.

Police READS 2013 participating agencies include Durham Police Department, City of Durham, Durham County Sheriff's Office, North Carolina State Highway Patrol, N.C. Central University Police Department, Duke University Police Department, Durham Public Schools, East Durham Children's Initiative, North Carolina Department of Public Safety and National Night Out.

A Culmination Ceremony/Pep Rally was held at 1:30 p.m. on May 3 in the gymnasium of Y.E. Smith Elementary School, 2410 East Main Street. Guests include the Duke University and North Carolina Central University cheerleaders and mascots, Wool E. Bull and local law enforcement officers.

Police Athletic League – The Police Athletic League's baseball teams played approximately 80 games from mid-April through mid-June. The participants were boys and girls, 5 to 12 years old. The season ended with a Family Fun Day at Long Meadow field on June 15. During the season, the PAL coaches and some players participated in a clean-up day, which involved cleaning Scarborough and Long Meadow fields as well as a nearby creek. The PAL summer basketball league for 15 to 18 year olds started in mid-June.

Police Athletic League Mentoring Program – The Police Athletic League (PAL) Mentoring Program completed its spring semester at Eastway Elementary School. Thirty students participated in the program. Students were taken on a field trip to Wilmington and Fort Fisher at the end of the semester.

N.C. Special Olympics Events - The Chick-Fil-A "Cops on Top" event to raise money for North Carolina Special Olympics and the North Carolina Law Enforcement Torch Run was held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Friday, April 19 at the Chick-Fil-A restaurants at 3429 Hillsborough Road and 3912 North Roxboro Road. DPD employees also participated in the N.C. Special Olympics Torch Run on May 30. They carried the torch from Durham Police Headquarters to Sheetz on T.W. Alexander Drive, where the torch was handed over to Wake County law enforcement officers. The Durham Police Department has raised almost \$40,000 for North Carolina Special Olympics since 2008.

Commander's Tours - Command staff and officers assigned to police districts 3 and 4 visited 18 neighborhoods during May and June as part of the department's 2013 Commander's Tours. Commander's Tours conveniently bring district commanders and uniformed patrol officers to the heart of the neighborhoods they serve to meet residents and discuss safety concerns and community issues in a casual, outdoor setting.

Junior Bulls Drug Free Kids - The Durham Police Department, through assistance from HITDA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas) grant funds, sponsored the 2013 Junior Bulls Drug Free Kids program in partnership with Drug Free NC and the Durham Bulls. The Community Resource Unit in collaboration with commanders from districts 1 and 4 identified 80 Durham underprivileged youth to attend Durham Bulls games with the desired goal to have parents and kids to have open discussion about abstaining from drug usage. Volunteer DPD employees chaperoned these youth to five games this summer.

Training Division 2nd Quarter Activities

Active Shooter Training - The Training Division began what they intend to be biannual training for preparing for an active shooter. Instruction was given on the basics of patrol response to such an incident. Then practical exercises were conducted at Lucas Middle School every Saturday and Sunday in the months of March and May. The Training Division conducted similar training at another Durham location every Sunday in June.

Criminal Intelligence Unit/Crime Analysis Unit 2nd Quarter Activities

CIU Investigations – During the second quarter, investigators with the Criminal Intelligence Unit assisted with several homicide and aggravated assault investigations. Information gathered by CIU investigators helped recover several firearms. CIU investigators assisted several districts with Violent Incident Reviews during the second quarter. They also assisted with a Violent Offender Notification and a probation operation.

Crime Analysis Staffing – A new crime analyst, Timothy Grapperhaus, started in mid-June, which brought the unit up to full staffing for the first time in over six months. Grapperhaus came to the department with previous experience as a law enforcement analyst in St. Louis, MO, and most recently working with the Fire Department in Cary, NC. Grapperhaus has been assigned to District 4.

Geographic Profiling Analyst - During the month of April, Analyst Sallie Vaughn attended training in Winston Salem to learn about the geography of crime and subsequently earned her certification as a Geographic Profiling Analyst.

Crime Series – Employees of the Crime Analysis Unit identified suspects and/or assisted investigators in several crime series during the second quarter. They helped identify a suspect in several larcenies/robberies involving customers with bank bags in bank parking lots. They also assisted with a series of thefts involving cell phones, a series of scooter/moped thefts, residential burglaries, commercial robberies, rooftop larcenies of copper from air-conditioning units and a series of purse snatchings.

Awards and Honors

CALEA Accreditation Assessment - The Durham Police Department held an on-site Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) accreditation assessment from June 9 to 12. The on-site assessment is part of a program to achieve accreditation by verifying a department meets professional standards. Administered by CALEA, the accreditation program requires agencies to comply with state-of-the-art standards in four basic areas: policy and procedures, administration, operations, and support services. The Durham Police Department has been a CALEA accredited agency since 1991. The Police Department has this year been recommended for a gold standard accreditation, the highest level possible.

FBI National Academy Graduate - Deputy Durham Police Chief Larry Smith graduated from the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Va. Smith, who joined the Durham Police Department in 1988, is Deputy Chief – Operations, which consists of the Investigative Services Bureau, Northside Operations and Southside Operations. Smith attended the 253rd FBI Academy, which included 216 students from 24 different countries. During the 10-week program, Smith attended college level classes in Leadership, Statement Analysis, Media Relations, Legal Issues for Command Level Officers and Physical Fitness. Students at the National Academy shared information about their departments and discussed how they handle law enforcement issues and concerns. Smith recently attended the Senior Management Institute for Police in Boston. He is a native of Durham and a graduate of Northern High School and Campbell University. Other DPD graduates of the FBI National Academy include Police Chief Jose L. Lopez Sr., Assistant Chief Jon Peter and Capt. Ed Sarvis.



Lojack Award – Investigators Gregory Silla and Mark Feskanich received the LoJack Award from the International Association of Auto Theft Investigators -Southeast Regional Chapter on June 18 for their work in dismantling a large chop shop operation in the fall of 2012. Officers discovered the 44,500 square foot warehouse after tracking a LoJack activation in September 2012. Investigators found evidence of stolen parts from at least 40 vehicles and the chop shop has been linked to Maryland, Virginia and Ohio. Durham investigators are working with officers from the Fairfax County (VA) Auto Theft Unit, NC Department of Motor Vehicles, National Insurance Crime Bureau and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Samer Othman, 35, of Durham was arrested and is facing multiple felony charges.



Durham Jaycees Outstanding Young Public Servant – Master Officer/CrimeStoppers Coordinator Brandon Parrott received the Durham Jaycees 2013 Outstanding Young Public Servant Award on April 9. This award is given to a correctional officer, firefighter, law enforcement officer,

EMS worker or other rescuer aged 21-40 who is a full-time or volunteer employee of one of the aforementioned areas, and through their own resources, has achieved success and leadership in their professions and who has contributed to their community by being active in civic work.

April STAR – Crime Analyst Brian Aagaard was selected as a City of Durham STAR in April. The nomination said, “Congratulations to Brian Aagaard the first Certified Law Enforcement Analyst (CLEA) in the history of the Durham Police Department. This is a prestigious and difficult certification to obtain, capped off by a certification exam. There are only 42 CLEAs internationally. Brian’s accomplishment has a positive impact on the reputation of the Durham Police Department and the Crime Analysis Unit. Great job Brian!”

Above and Beyond

Cardiac Arrest – On June 16, officers were dispatched a call about a cardiac arrest on Onslow Street. Investigator Kelly Stewart heard the call on his radio and immediately responded. When he arrived, he found a male who was not breathing and began performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Investigator Stewart continued performing CPR until paramedics arrived on the scene. The male began breathing and was transported to the hospital for treatment.

Above and Beyond – Officers responded to a home invasion at a residence occupied by a 91-year-old female in District 4. Officers were concerned about the victim's welfare and decided to continue to assist her. Officer Dana Keith repaired the victim's door at no charge while Master Officer Steve Hall with the Community Resources Unit cut her grass for free. Employees from Neighborhood Improvement Services cut back the trees and shrubbery surrounding the house, which may have played a role in why the house was targeted. Local businessman Jonathan Farrar cleaned the victim's gutters for free. District 4 officers stopped to visit with the victim and performed several directed patrols in the area. The house was also added to the District 4 COP visitation list. Last month Sgt. Delondon Gaither stopped by the house and hauled away bags of items for the victim and Officer J.D. Graham is helping the victim with the yard and landscaping.
